



Thereafter the fortunes of the Louvre languished until the tumultuous days of the French Revolution when, during the Reign of Terror in 1793, it first opened its doors to display the nation's treasures. Ever since—through the Napoleonic era, the Commune, two World Wars, to the present—the Louvre has been a witness to French history, and expanded to become home to a legendary collection whose often-complicated and mysterious origins form a spectacular narrative that rivals the building's grand stature. 

At the same time, Hessler and his wife enrolled their twin daughters in a local state-run elementary school, where they were the only Westerners in a student body of about two thousand. Over the years, Hessler had kept in close contact with more than a hundred of his former students, who were now in their forties. By reconnecting with these individuals--members of China's "Reform generation"--while teaching current undergrads, Hessler was able to gain a unique perspective on China's incredible transformation over the past quarter-century.

In the late 1990s, almost all of Hessler's students were the first member of their extended families to become educated. Their parents were subsistence farmers who could offer little guidance as their children entered a brand-new world. By 2019, when Hessler arrived at Sichuan University, he found a very different China and a new kind of student - an only child whose schooling was the object of intense focus from a much more ambitious and sophisticated cohort of parents. Hessler's new students have a sense of irony about the regime but mostly navigate its restrictions with equanimity, and embrace the astonishing new opportunities China's boom affords. But the pressures of this system of extreme "meritocracy" at scale can be gruesome, even for much younger children, including his own daughters, who give him and his wife an intimate view into the experience at their local school.

In Peter Hessler's hands, China's education system is the perfect vehicle for examining what's happened to the country, where it's going, and what we can learn from it, for good and ill. At a time when anti-Chinese rhetoric in America has grown blunter and uglier, Other Rivers is a tremendous, indeed an essential gift, a work of enormous human empathy that rejects cheap stereotypes and shows us China from the inside out and the bottom up, using as a measuring stick this most universally relatable set of experiences. As both a window onto China and a distant mirror onto America and its own education system, Other Mirrors is a classic, a book of tremendous value and compelling human interest.





This is the first full-length biography of Piet Mondrian. Following years of painting representational art in which he made his subject matter woodland scenery, sand dunes, lighthouses, farmland, flowers, and men and women whom he knew, Mondrian ended up determining that the pinnacle of art occurs only when it has no subjective representation whatsoever. The artist developed, in the course of his artistic formation, a passionate wish to avoid "the tragic"—his term for the natural world on which he focused—and a belief that the ultimate value of art occurs only when it represents no known subject. He developed compositions that consist of vertical and horizontal straight lines—diagonals forbidden—these lines inevitably painted black, and, on a white background. That setting consists in most instances of more than one white, although the differences are scarcely perceptible. Within the composition, solid blocks of primary colors—red, blue, and yellow—either alone or paired or as a trio, are positioned for maximum rhythm and movement. Weber charts the artist's life from birth through his move from his native The Netherlands to Paris in 1919, which is when Mondrian completed the purification of his work, and on through his life in London and New York, where he painted his renowned last work, Broadway Boogie Woogie. Weber focuses on the psychological and biographical factors that drove the artist toward the achievement with which he ultimately changed the visible world. [Complete Manuscript]

This first biography of Anni Albers will reveal her complex persona and explore in depth the extraordinary facts of her lifetime. Born to a wealthy household in fashionable Berlin, she gave up its luxuries and the expectation that she should simply live the life of a privileged wife and mother and chose, instead, to enter, at age twenty-two, the pioneering new Bauhaus School. At the Bauhaus, she met and fell in love with Josef Albers, who was, besides being eleven years her senior, from a working-class family in the industrial city of Bottrop. Josef was Catholic, while Anni was Jewish. Not only did the Bauhaus have an unwritten Jewish guota, but antisemitism in Germany would determine the ultimate fate of Albers and her family. Anni's relationship to her and Josef's families, and much else, will be considered in this biography. Her connections with Walter Gropius and two of Gropius's wives (the first the renowned Alma Mahler,) with Wassily and Nina Kandinsky, with Paul and Lily Klee and their son Felix, and with Mies Van der Rohe and his tempestuous lover, Lily Reich—who, said Philip Johnson, competed nastily with Albers for attention as a weaver—and other aspects of her life at the Bauhaus will be included. So will her and Josef's move to the experimental Black Mountain College in 1933 and her relationship with others there, including the founder Ted Dreier, and the sculptor Ruth Asawa, the composer John Cage, and the choreographer Merce Cunningham. Following her move to New Haven, Connecticut in 1950 when Josef became Director of Design at Yale University, Anni Albers studied archaeology at the same time that she and Josef voraciously collected pre-Columbian art during their travels to Mexico and Peru; she undertook major weaving commissions, among them a Torah screen and a memorial to victims of the Holocaust; she made textiles for architects and for companies like Knoll; and she took up printmaking. In this last domain, she responded happily to various possibilities of process and developed numerous unprecedented techniques — combining photo offset and silkscreen in a single work, using an acid bath, printing the same screen in multiple directions, and utilizing the natural tremor of her atrophied hands.
