
Violet wishes her life were different. Her best friend is away for the summer, her father has moved out and she's living alone with her mother who has social anxiety.

My Nest Of Silence tells the story of Mak, who leaves his family in Manzanar to fight in the European theater, and of his ten-year-old sister Mari, who, frustrated over her brother risking his life for the government that imprisoned them, decides to stop talking until he returns. The narrative alternates between Mak's experiences at training camp and at war and Mari's time in isolated community of Manzanar.


Today's young readers will be given a historical perspective on current headlines about internment and political policies based on race and religion. With its mix of wartime action and more introspective scenes, the book will appeal to both reluctant and advanced readers.
